They wanted to use the information for a "History of Medicine in the Chippewa Valley" project, so we spent some hours together. Then Jim Alf, brother of our classmate, Rod Alf, put together the information in written form, and, when he finished, he asked me to edit it. It is now posted on the CVM website, *ChippePedia.org*. You'll find it under "polio" if you'd like to read it. One of the major reasons I'm mentioning it here is I have found out, as a result of this project that, in recent years, MANY children are not being inoculated or given vaccines by their parents to protect them from polio and other serious diseases. People who work with children are worried that polio may come back, in epidemic form, if young parents don't safeguard their babies. So, if you have children, grandchildren, or great-grandchildren, and they have not had the Salk Vaccine against polio, please step-in, and make sure they do. No one should ever have to have polio again!

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
