Named Finalist in Merit Tests

Three seniors from ECHS, Richard Kennedy, Kenneth Lippen and Judith Meltz, have been named finalists in the National Medit Scholarship Competition of 1957.

This nationwide college aptitude examination in 12,500 high schools on October 24, 1956. On January 12, 1957, the finalists took a three hour college board examination at hour college board examination at ECHS and were screened for leader-ship and extra curricular activities by a selection board. This test was given by the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, New Jersey, Mr. T. R. Kunz is the supervisor for Eau Claire.

Scholeste, Activida, Tests, and

Scholastic Aptitude Tests and Achievement Tests will again be given on March 16. Students must register with the Educational Testing Service — 20 Nassau St. Princeton. New Jersey, three weeks in advance. Some colleges require that students take the college entrance examination and students should check to to see if their specific school requires this test, or not. About April 25, a fortunate 700 will become the Merit Scholars of 1957.

The value of each scholarship varies from \$100 per year to \$2,200 per year or more. Merit Scholars choose the college they wish to attend, and the colleges chosen will get grants averaging \$2,000 per scholarship to help defray the actual cost of educating the students. Funds are provided by business and industrial corporations, professional so-cieties, and even individuals interested in helping students of high ability.
